

Dairy Products, Milk & Milk Substitute Beverages

These best practice reporting tips have been developed specifically for businesses that distribute dairy products and milk and milk substitute beverages to consumers.

Intro:

Canadian Stewardship Services Alliance has created best practice reporting tips for specific sectors. These tips are designed to assist you in preparing your steward reports and to help you identify the proper material reporting categories for the common packaging and paper products used by businesses in this sector. These tips are provided for your guidance only. General Tips:

✓ Reporting Beverage Milk and Milk Substitutes:

Recycle BC:

- Milk is not on deposit when milk appears as one of the first three ingredients in the ingredient list and needs to be reported to Recycle BC
- Milk substitutes (milk substitutes from vegetables, nuts or grains) are not on deposit and need to be reported to Recycle BC
- Ready-to-drink infant formula, dietary supplements and meal replacements are not on deposit and need to be reported to Recycle BC

MMSW:

- Milk and milk substitute beverages are on deposit in Saskatchewan and should not be reported to MMSW. This includes: milk, buttermilk, cream, fluid coffee cream, lactose-free milk products, drinkable yogurts, soy milk, almond milk, rice milk, coconut milk, etc.
 - Ready-to-drink infant formula, dietary supplements & meal replacement beverages are not on deposit and should be reported to MMSW
- ✓ Stewards may be able to use the Component Threshold Rule in reporting packaging that is made up of two or more different material types when certain components of the package constitute a small proportion of the entire package. Please see Part Two, section [2.4.1 of the Guidebook](#) for more details on how to use the Component Threshold Rule.
- ✓ Please check the resin codes on your plastic packaging as different plastics are reported under different material subcategories.
- ✓ Please ensure that all HR-related documents and business cards are included in your report.
- ✓ Please include all secondary packaging that goes to the household such as the plastic wrap around multiple tubs of yogurt or the plastic wrap around multiple bottles of yogurt drinks.

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FAQ:

Why are some materials designated in some provinces but not in others and how can I simplify my reporting?

The designated materials for each provincial program are determined by provincial government regulation. To streamline the reporting process for stewards who report across multiple programs, CSSA developed a standardized national materials list. Provincial specific reporting is also available, and the portal allows stewards to choose their preferred method of reporting (either national or provincial). Please note that if you do use the national list, all the national material categories map directly to the provincial material categories.

What do I do if I supply the same product to both commercial and residential consumers?

If you supply the same product to residential consumers and commercial customers, the PPP associated with the product supplied to commercial (IC&I) customers should be excluded from your report if the commercial customer never re-supplies the material to a residential consumer and will dispose of the PPP through commercial waste management services. Stewards must report on all PPP associated with products supplied to residential consumers. Stewards must be able to demonstrate that the PPP excluded from their report was supplied to commercial customers for their consumption and does not enter the residential waste stream.

Should I report the caps for my milk containers under Milk and Milk Substitutes or Non-Beverage?

In provinces where these containers are not on deposit, stewards are to report caps, lids, and bottle rings from beverage containers under the appropriate non-beverage material categories when not using the component threshold rule.

Do I report transportation packaging?

Transportation packaging such as corrugate shippers or pallet wrap or any other material used for the delivery of the product to a retail outlet that is never supplied to a residential consumer and is disposed of or recycled outside the residential waste stream should be excluded from your steward report. Stewards must ensure proper documentation is maintained to support the portion of material excluded from their steward report.
